Forum

Editor's note: In the coming issues of Prop Kicks we will try to have more club member involvement within the newsletter. This may take the form of opinions, shared experiences or just a different slant on old practices. Don't be surprised if I ask you to contribute an idea or thought. Everyone has something of value to share with the club.

Ex-Editor Comes Out of Retirement

I have been asked to contribute some thoughts to the newsletter and, coincidentally, I had been thinking about doing just that. It has been 5 years since I have had the opportunity to put my thoughts to paper and my subject is one that bewilders me when I look into the radio compartments of many r/c aircraft.

According to r/c manufactures and service experts, all radio

gear, within the aircraft, should be wrapped in a minimum of 1/4" of quality foam rubber to absorb engine vibration. This vibration can cause damage to solder joints, printed circuit boards and delicate electronic components. I have seen receives tie-wrapped to cross members or attached only with Velcro without first being wrapped in foam rubber. Almost as bad, batteries anchored in place with only plywood plate and 2 screws. Again, no foam rubber. With engines transmitting over 14,000 beats per minute, how long these components will continue to function is anybody's guess.

Please follow the rules of accepted r/c practices. Safety is no accident.

Field Safety

I would imagine that the most frequent injury that occurs seen in our hobby is flyers getting their fingers in a spinning propeller. Other safety risks occur when airplanes are taxied / flown unsafely or not maintained properly, causing them to run into people or property. Safety at the flying field needs to be a top priority and on everyone's mind every time they fly. Following are some tips to help prevent injuries and keep our AMA insurance costs low:

- Use a chicken stick or electric starter. Make it a policy to never have your fingers in the prop arc take my word for it! Paint the tips of your propellers red or white and consciously move your hand in a wide arc around the spinning prop. People often just forget in their haste and try to reach through a running prop to get at the needle valve or glow starter. Throw out any damaged props.
- Restrain your plane with one of the benches at West field or have someone hold it. Don't taxi in the pits hold onto your plane until it's on the runway. When a motor is running, stay out of the prop arc in case a blade is thrown.
- Maintain your plane. Aircraft with loose parts or that are obviously under-maintained will not be permitted at the field until they're repaired.
- Keep your transmitter in the impound unless you are in possession of the frequency pin.
- Never fly behind the runway, except for the far left side at West field. Don't fly in such a way that the momentum of the plane is toward the flight line – fly side to side.
